What is the difference between bifocals and progressives?

The term "bifocal" refers to the lens type with the characteristic "line" in the lens which is usually quite visible. This type of lens was commonly used in the past, but in more recent years the "progressive" lens is becoming more popular. Both the bifocal lens and the progressive lens are referred to as "multifocal" lenses. Patients usually require a multifocal lens if they have

both a distance and a reading prescription. This change in near vision, called presbyopia, occurs in virtually everyone in their early-to-mid 40s and is not a disease process. Both multifocal lens types have advantages and disadvantages. Both require an "adaptation period" of approximately 2-4 weeks. This is because patients are not used to having a near prescription in the lower part of their vision when looking into the distance. This tends to cause sensation of being "off-balance" for a short period. This sensation will be present initially to some extent for all lenses, but some of the newer progressive designs minimize (but still not totally remove) this effect. Bifocal lenses do not correct intermediation vision well, especially in higher reading prescriptions (*i.e.* for the computer) and have a "blind area" as one looks from the distance to the near portion of the lens. However, one of the few advantages of bifocals is that they tend

to have a slightly larger reading area compared to most progressives. Advantages of progressive lenses over bifocals are; (i) they do not have the unsightly "line", (ii) they have a portion that deals with the intermediate zone of

bifocals are; (i) they do not have the unsightly "line", (ii) they have a portion that deals with the intermediate zone of vision and (iii) there is no "blind" area (known as a scotoma).

However, all progressives have, to some extent, some peripheral lens distortion inherent in the lens design (this is how the "line" is eliminated). The amount of distortion, however, significantly depends on the technology of the lens chosen. More recent advances, using "free form technology", have resulted in excellent progressive lenses which further minimize adaptation problems. You should always find out the exact type of progressive you are going into. Make sure your eye health care professional gives you information on "good, better and best" in terms of your progressive lens if you choose this route of correction. Sometimes paying a little extra for a better progressive lens is well worth it. Remember, you will be looking through this lens for at least 2 years!
