
#### **Question:**

I am not sure who is covered and who is not covered for eye examinations

by OHIP, can you clarify this issue?

### Answer:

OHIP still covers annual eye examinations for all children aged 19 and younger and seniors aged 65 years or older. If you are aged 20-64 you can still be covered by OHIP for your eye examination if you are found to have a disease process that can potentially affect your vision. There are currently ten categories of such conditions and your eye doctor will inform you if you are eligible for coverage under OHIP. For example, conditions such as diabetes and glaucoma are covered. If you are aged 20-64 and are found to be otherwise healthy (i.e. you only require correction with glasses or contact lenses but have no active pathology), then there will be an eye examination fee. This fee usually ranges anywhere from \$80-\$140 and is recommended at least every two years (every year if you are over 40). The cost will vary, but always ask what the fee includes. We include both a retinal scan (i.e. a digital retinal photo) and a peripheral visual field test (which checks the health and function of your optic nerve) in the cost of the initial eye examination. Keep in mind that this is a small price to pay to ensure your eyes are thoroughly assessed. Your vision is precious and it is important to ensure that your eyes remain healthy. It is worth stressing that you should have your eyes examined even if you see well as there are many eye diseases that do not cause vision loss until they are relatively advanced and often irreversible (e.g. in glaucoma, your peripheral vision is lost slowly over time). Always keep in mind that continuity of care is important. Try to find an optometrist that you are comfortable with and do your best to remain with that practitioner whenever possible. This continuity of care helps your optometrist to build up a history on you in terms of your eye health. This history makes it easier for your eye doctor to detect change that is unusual for you. Keep in mind that if you have insurance through your work, the cost of the eye examination may be reimbursed.

### **Question:**

Is it a good idea to have my child's eyes examined prior to starting school?

#### **Answer:**

Absolutely. Approximately 80% of all learning is visual. A high proportion of children with "learning difficulties" simply have an eye condition that has not been addressed. For example, occasional eye turns or uncorrected prescriptions can cause blurred vision, headaches and even double vision which occur to a greater degree when the child is doing close work. Thus, quite often the child does not like doing homework (or any near work for that matter) simply because it is very uncomfortable to do so. In addition, I have assessed many children with "dyslexia" who have simply had a binocular vision issue (i.e. both eyes were not co-ordinating their eye movements properly). All these children needed to function normally was computerized eye muscle therapy or the use of "prismatic correction" in their glasses. In the patients that I have treated with computerized eye muscle therapy, a vast improvement in reading ability and elimination of headaches can be observed in a high proportion of cases. The bottom line is that if you suspect that your child may have a learning issue, make sure to get their eyes examination prior to exploring other causes. Their eyes are often the explanation for their problems. As eye examinations for children are still covered by OHIP, there is really very little reason to avoid making an appointment with an optometrist. If your child sees well and appears to have no issues, get them checked anyway. Like the old saying goes, an ounce of prevention beats a pound of cure!
